I searched for a poem about falling leaves and found this one, "The Falling Leaves," published by Margaret Postgate Cole in November 1915, at the height of the First World War.

Today, as I rode by,
I saw the brown leaves dropping from their tree
In a still afternoon,
When no wind whirled them whistling to the sky,
But thickly, silently,
They fell, like snowflakes wiping out the noon;
And wandered slowly thence
For thinking of a gallant multitude
Which now all withering lay,
Slain by no wind of age or pestilence,
But in their beauty strewed
Like snowflakes falling on the Flemish clay.

Not only does this poem fit our November mood but its author, a socialist who helped her brother secure conscientious objector status from WWI and later went on to found the Society for Socialist Inquiry and Propaganda as well as the New Fabian Research Bureau, seems a fitting avatar and inspiration for our current moment. It reminds me that, no matter the historical circumstances or the political climate, poetry persists, and resists, and that's why we continue to write and teach it.


